## Rosemont District Fire Department Job Description

POSITION: Volunteer Fire Chief

REPORTS TO: Rosemont District Fire Board

POSITIONS SUPERVISED: Deputy Chief, Captains, Lieutenants, and Firefighters

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### JOB PURPOSE:

This is a senior administrative, operational and supervisor position responsible for planning, organizing, coordinating and directing all fire suppression, related emergency services, and fire prevention operations and programs for the Rosemont District Fire Department. The Fire Chief is responsible for the continuous development and improvement of all departmental services and exercises a high degree of independent action, judgement and initiative on administrative, operational and technical matters, problems and decisions in accordance with Department and OFM policies, procedures and objectives.

### DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Carries out all statutory duties of the position in accordance with federal and provincial statutes, including the *Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997* (FPPA), Occupational Health & Safety Act (OHSA), and the municipal Establishing and Regulating By-Laws.
- Supervises the overall administration of the Fire Department including the assignment and discipline of staff, preparation of operating and capital budgets and forecasts, requisitioning and control of materials, supplies and equipment and the preparation and maintenance of departmental records and reports.
- Organizes and assumes command of firefighting activities and related emergencies as required.
- Directs the operation, maintenance and repair of firefighting equipment.
- Plans for the orderly addition or replacement of facilities, vehicles and equipment relating to use, age or community growth.
- Directs the training of personnel engaged in firefighting, other emergency services and fire prevention and in the use of related equipment.
- Establishes rules, regulations and procedures for efficient departmental operations and consults with the Fire Board regarding major policy determination.
- Determines priorities to enable the most effective fire safety inspection and public education program delivery possible within available resource levels.
- Meets regularly with the Deputy Chief, Lieutenants, and Captains to ensure that all are following the policies, procedures and objectives of the department.

- Develops, implements and maintains Standard Operational Guidelines (SOG's) as required.
- Maintains the department communication systems.
- Maintains personnel records, prepares of payroll as required.
- Performs all duties as an assistant to the Fire Marshal, as prescribed by the FPPA.
- Demonstrates, promotes and instills professionalism in every aspect of the position.
- Exercises sound expenditure control activities within the Procurement Policy as adopted by the Board.
- Maintains a variety of statistical data, utilizing an electronic records management system and generates reports as required.
- Provides assistance and expertise to the Chief Building Official in respect of fire safety and protection systems required by the Ontario Building Code.
- Approves all training plans and programs for the department and ensures an acceptable skill level in areas of emergency response, fire safety inspections and public education programs, and ensures compliance with health and safety requirements relative to staff training.
- Maintains adequate staffing levels to permit the delivery of appropriate emergency response service.
- Attends Fire Board Meetings and Sub-Committee Meetings as required.
- Maintains records in accordance with retention policies.
- Other duties as assigned.

POSITION: Volunteer Deputy Fire Chief

REPORTS TO: Fire Chief & Rosemont District Fire Board

POSITIONS SUPERVISED: Captains, Lieutenants, and Firefighters

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### **JOB PURPOSE:**

Under the direction of the Fire Chief, the Deputy Fire Chief is responsible for firefighting and training in a supervisory role. The Deputy maintains discipline within the department. Assumes the duties of the Volunteer Fire Chief in his/her absence and enforces fire service legislation such as the Ontario Fire Code, the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, and the Ontario Building Code.

### **DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES:**

Under the direction of the Fire Chief the Deputy:

- Assists with carrying out all statutory duties of the position in accordance with federal and provincial statutes, including the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997 (FPPA), Occupational Health & Safety Act (OH&SAO), and the municipal Establishing and Regulating By-Laws.
- Assists with the supervision of the overall administration of the Fire Department including the assignment and discipline of staff, preparation of operating and capital budgets and forecasts, requisitioning and control of materials, supplies and equipment and the preparation and maintenance of departmental records and reports.
- Organizes and assumes command of firefighting activities and related emergencies as required.
- Assists with the direction of the operation, maintenance and repair of firefighting equipment.
- Assists with plans for the orderly addition or replacement of facilities, vehicles and equipment relating to use, age or community growth.
- Assists with the direction of the training of personnel engaged in firefighting, other emergency services and fire prevention and in the use of related equipment.
- Assists with establishing rules, regulations and procedures for efficient departmental operations and consults with the Fire Board regarding major policy determination.
- Assists with determining priorities to enable the most effective fire safety inspection and public education program delivery possible within available resource levels.
- Meets regularly with the Chief, Captains and Lieutenants to ensure that all are following the policies, procedures and objectives of the department.

- No formal working hours; on call 24/7 for emergency situations.
- Exposure to extremely dangerous physical hazards when commanding firefighting operations.
- Exposure to poor weather conditions and prolonged time on the job during firefighting and emergency situations.



## Rosemont District Volunteer Firefighters

POSITION: Volunteer Fire Captain

REPORTS TO: Fire Chief & Deputy Fire Chief

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### **JOB PURPOSE:**

To provide firefighting emergency services under the direction of the Fire Chief and Deputy Fire Chief. To provide leadership and guidance to personnel assigned to the Captains platoon or team.

### **DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES:**

- Assists with carrying out all statutory duties of the position in accordance with federal and provincial statutes, including the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997 (FPPA), Occupational Health & Safety Act (OH&SAO), and the municipal Establishing and Regulating By-Laws.
- At all times, operate within the Operational Guidelines of the Rosemont District Fire Department (RDFFD), and any other policy adopted by the RDFFD.
- Respond to fire, medical, rescue and other calls for emergency assistance, such as but not limited to automobile and industrial/agricultural accidents.
- Perform all emergency scene duties assigned such as, but not limited to, firefighting, forcible entry, search and rescue, carrying hoses, climbing ladders, deploying hose from fire apparatus, protecting those in danger due to fire, overhaul, technical rescue, emergency medical treatment and CPR, hazardous material response, property conservation, environmental conservation and secure emergency scene for the safety of the public and other firefighters.
- Control and extinguish fires using manual and power equipment, such as but not limited to fire apparatus, axes, hoses and ladders.
- Ability and willingness to assume the role and responsibility of Incident Command at an emergency scene in the absence of or at the direction of the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Chief.
- Ability to drive and operate all RDFFD fire apparatus in accordance with RDFFD Operational Guidelines and the Highway Traffic Act (HTA).
- After returning from the emergency scene, clean, inspect and return all vehicles and equipment used to a state of readiness.
- Prepare written reports when required.
- Maintain a high standard of professionalism, integrity, reliability and credibility, which are fundamental requirements of the fire service.
- Participate in public education and public relation events.

- Complete all required training and retraining as assigned to maintain a high level of firefighter readiness.
- Must be, at all times, psychologically and physically prepared to respond to emergencies of any kind.
- Willingness and ability to assume responsibility and direct fire crews at the task level of fire and rescue operations at the direction of the Incident Commander.
- Participate and lead in assigned hall duties to ensure that all equipment and apparatus are in a state of readiness.
- Keep fire station, equipment and grounds clean and orderly.

## **QUALIFICATIONS:**

- Minimum 18 years of age.
- Minimum 3 years with the RDFD or combined service with another fire service at the rank of Lieutenant or above.
- Hold a valid DZ driver's license.
- Daytime/midweek availability for emergency calls is an asset.
- Maintain a clean vulnerable sector criminal record check.
- NFPA 1001- Firefighter I & II.
- NFPA 1002- Pump Operations.
- NFPA 1021- Fire Officer I & II or willingness to obtain within reasonable time frame as decided by the Fire Chief.
- NFPA 1035- Fire and Life Safety Educator or willingness to obtain within reasonable time frame as decided by the Fire Chief.
- NFPA 1041- Fire Training Officer I and willingness to obtain Level II
- NFPA 1521 – Incident Safety Officer or willingness to obtain within reasonable time frame as determined by the Fire Chief.
- Demonstrate a commitment to continuous learning.
- Signed off to drive and operate all RDFD apparatus and ability to demonstrate proficient knowledge and operational ability of all RDFD equipment.

POSITION: Volunteer Fire Lieutenant

REPORTS TO: Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief and Captains

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### **JOB PURPOSE:**

To provide firefighting emergency services under the direction of the Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief and Captains.

### **DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES:**

- Assists with carrying out all statutory duties of the position in accordance with federal and provincial statutes, including the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997 (FPPA), Occupational Health & Safety Act (OH&SAO), and the municipal Establishing and Regulating By-Laws.
- At all times, operate within the Operational Guidelines of the Rosemont District Fire Department (RDFD), and any other policy adopted by the RDFD.
- Respond to fire, medical, rescue and other calls for emergency assistance, such as but not limited to automobile and industrial/agricultural accidents.
- Perform all emergency scene duties assigned such as, but not limited to, firefighting, forcible entry, search and rescue, carrying hoses, climbing ladders, deploying hose from fire apparatus, protecting those in danger due to fire, overhaul, technical rescue, emergency medical treatment and CPR, hazardous material response, property conservation, environmental conservation and secure emergency scene for the safety of the public and other firefighters.
- Control and extinguish fires using manual and power equipment, such as but not limited to fire apparatus, axes, hoses and ladders.
- Ability and willingness to assume the role and responsibility of Incident Command at an emergency scene in the absence of a more senior Officer or at the direction of the Fire Chief or Deputy Fire Chief.

- After returning from the emergency scene, clean, inspect and return all vehicles and equipment used to a state of readiness.
- Prepare written reports when required.
- Maintain a high standard of professionalism, integrity, reliability and credibility, which are fundamental requirements of the fire service.
- Participate in public education and public relation events.

- Complete all required training and retraining as assigned to maintain a high level of firefighter readiness.
- Must be, at all times, psychologically and physically prepared to respond to emergencies of any kind.
- Willingness and ability to assume responsibility for fire crews at the task level of fire and rescue operations in the absence of a Captain at the direction of the Incident Commander.

REPORTS TO: Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief, Captains and Lieutenants

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### **JOB PURPOSE:**

To provide firefighting emergency services under the direction of the Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief, Captains and Lieutenants.

### **DUTIES & RESPONSIBILITIES:**

- Assists with carrying out all statutory duties of the position in accordance with federal and provincial statutes, including the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997 (FPPA), Occupational Health & Safety Act (OH&SAO), and the municipal Establishing and Regulating By-Laws.
- At all times, operate within the Operational Guidelines of the Rosemont District Fire Department (RDFD), and any other policy adopted by the RDFD.
- Respond to fire, medical, rescue and other calls for emergency assistance, such as but not limited to automobile and industrial/agricultural accidents.
- Perform all emergency scene duties assigned such as, but not limited to, firefighting, forcible entry, search and rescue, carrying hoses, climbing ladders, deploying hose from fire apparatus, protecting those in danger due to fire, overhaul, technical rescue, emergency medical treatment and CPR, hazardous material response, property conservation, environmental conservation and secure emergency scene for the safety of the public and other firefighters.
- Control and extinguish fires using manual and power equipment, such as but not limited to fire apparatus, axes, hoses and ladders.
- Drive and operate all RDFD fire apparatus in accordance with RDFD Operational Guidelines and the Highway Traffic Act (HTA).
- After returning from the emergency scene, clean, inspect and return all vehicles and equipment used to a state of readiness.
- Prepare written reports when required.
- Maintain a high standard of professionalism, integrity, reliability and credibility, which are fundamental requirements of the fire service.
- Participate in public education and public relation events.
- Complete all required training and retraining as assigned to maintain a high level of firefighter readiness.
- Must be, at all times, psychologically and physically prepared to respond to emergencies of any kind.

- Participate in assigned hall duties to ensure that all equipment and apparatus are in a state of readiness.
- Keep fire station, equipment and grounds clean and orderly.

#### **QUALIFICATIONS:**

- Minimum 18 years of age.
- Reside or work near the Fire Station located at 955716 7<sup>th</sup> Line E, Rosemont.
- Hold a valid G driver's license and the willingness and ability to obtain DZ license.
- Must provide and maintain a clean driver's abstract.
- Daytime/midweek availability for emergency calls is an asset.
- Maintain a clean vulnerable sector criminal record check.
- NFPA 1001- Firefighter I & II or willingness to obtain within a reasonable time frame as determined by the Fire Chief.
- NFPA 1002- Pump Operations or willingness to obtain within a reasonable time frame as determined by the Fire Chief.
- NFPA 1035- Fire and Life Safety Educator or willingness to obtain.
- Demonstrate a commitment to continuous learning.

## Tangible Capital Asset Policy

### 1. Purpose

A framework is established for the management and control of the Board's capital assets. Included in this framework is proper recognition, measurement, thresholds, amortization, reporting, safeguarding and disposal. This capital asset policy promotes sound corporate management of capital assets and complies with the PS3150 which regulates the accounting treatment of capital assets for local governments.

### 2. Scope

All tangible property owned by the Board, either through donation or purchase and which qualifies as a capital asset is addressed in this policy. In accordance with PS 3150, tangible capital assets (TCA) are non-financial assets having physical substance that:

- a) are held for use in the production or supply of goods and services, for rental to others, for administrative purposes, or for the development, construction, maintenance or repair of other tangible capital assets;
- b) have useful economic lives extending beyond an accounting period;
- c) are to be used on a continuing basis; and
- d) are not for sale in the ordinary course of operations.

Where a tangible capital asset is being held in inventory for use in the construction of a tangible capital asset they will be accounted for as "work in progress" until they form part of the new tangible capital asset is put into service.

### 3. Principles

The principles in this policy provide guidance for policy development and assist with the interpretation of the policy.

- a. This policy is for the benefit of the Board as a whole; for the users of the Board's financial statements and managers of the Board's tangible capital assets.
- b. The cost associated with data collection and storage must be balanced with the benefits achieved by users of the data and reports.
- c. Budgeting follows PS 3150. Only capital items meeting the capital asset criteria in this policy will be recorded as capital.
- d. Compliance is with all legislation applicable to municipalities.

- e. Financial, operational and information technology system limitations are considered.
- f. Materiality is considered.
- g. Reporting guidelines are met.

#### 4. **Asset Classification**

4.1 All TCA's will be classified within one of these major categories:

- a) Land
- b) Land Improvements (includes amortizable improvements to land such as parking lots, fences, pathways, etc.)
- c) Building
- d) Vehicles
- e) Equipment
- f) Furniture and Fixtures

#### 5. **Recording and Valuing Assets**

##### 5.1 **Capitalization Threshold**

The capitalization threshold shall be \$2,500 for every TCA set up in the Asset Register.

##### 5.2 **Donated/Downloaded Assets**

Assets that were acquired by donation or by downloading will be valued using fair market value at the date of contribution, if available. If not, value will be based on discounted replacement cost and set-up at that value.

##### 5.3 **Shared and Jointly Owned Assets**

All assets are shared and jointly owned by Mulmur Township, Adjala-Tosorontio Township and the Town of Mono in accordance with the agreement establishing the joint Board.

#### 6. **Betterments vs Maintenance**

Betterments occur when physical output or service capacity is increased, when useful life is extended, and when quality of output is improved. Betterments are to be treated as a Capital Asset addition for the TCA to which they relate and shall be recorded as a separate asset with its own useful life. Betterments may in fact be a replacement of an asset (such as a new roof) and so the old asset will be written-off as disposed, and the betterment set up as a new asset.

#### 7. **Pooled Tangible Capital Assets**

TCA's will be pooled when they are numerous enough that, when taken collectively, their value exceeds the Pooling Threshold of \$2,500. Exceptions are made,

however, in some cases, where it has been decided the value of amortizing is not worth the time to set up those assets, and therefore the Board accepts that these assets will continue to be expensed in full in the year of purchase (as they were pre-PSAB). Examples of pooled assets would be:

- Furniture and fixtures
- Small tools/equipment
- Hoses & couplers
- Breathing equipment
- Bunker gear
- Communication Equipment (portable radios & pagers)

When additional items are bought, accounting treatment will be to set up the bulk purchase as a new, single pooled asset (e.g. 5 tables are bought in 2020 to replace some already in use). A disposal will be recorded against the old, pooled asset, in proportion to the number of units replaced versus the number of units in that pooled asset.

## **8. Components**

The following tangible capital asset will be set up as a multiple component, and not as a single asset:

- Buildings will be set up as 3 components: HVAC systems, roof, and structure.

## **9. Constructed Assets**

Tangible capital assets, which are newly constructed, will be treated as Work-in-Progress, and reflected in the financial statements as a separate category of TCA, with zero amortization, whenever they remain incomplete as at year end. Whenever the asset begins to be used which is not necessarily when the asset is completed, it will be set up as one or more TCA under the applicable rules and amortization will begin in the year following the start of usage of the asset.

## **10. Element of Cost**

Any single TCA's cost will, per PSAB, include the purchase price as well as:

- Installation costs
- Design, engineering and architectural fees and staff costs
- Legal fees
- Survey and site preparation costs
- Freight, transportation insurance, and duties
- Carrying charges/interest in the case where borrowing is done to finance a project, but only during the period up to the time that the asset is recorded as a TCA. Interest paid after capitalization will be treated as an operating budget expense.

## 11. Valuation

All TCA's will be valued at cost.

## 12. Amortization

All TCA's, excluding land, will be amortized using the *straight-line method*. This method is preferred for its simplicity and ease-of-use. Assets will be amortized for half of the year in the year that the asset is purchased.

Amortization entries shall be posted by the applicable staff to the General Ledger on an annual basis, so that it may be presented to the Board and Councils on the year end statements.

The useful life of each sub-class of a TCA will be set based on consultation with department staff, and review of estimates used in other municipalities. Unless there is a significant difference in the type of sub-class, only one useful life estimate will be used to every TCA in that sub-class. e.g. if one building has a steel roof and another building has a shingle roof, then their useful life estimates may be different.

Residual values will not be estimated or used by the Fire Department. When an asset is sold or traded, the proceeds will be compared to the remaining Net Book Value (NBV), and the disposal will be recorded, the asset's NBV shall be written-off, and a gain or loss on sale recognized.

Write-downs will be done after annual reviews of useful life estimates. The Treasurer or designate will conduct an annual review in conjunction with the Fire Chief or designate to determine if there are any write-downs to be recorded.

When a write-down is required, a journal entry to record the additional amortization required, per the review decision, and before year-end, will be posted immediately following the review, and before year-end, so that the NBV at the year-end matches the decision made jointly at the review by the Treasurer or designate.

A record of all annual reviews, and a written authorization for any write-downs, will be kept in the TCA files within the accounting department, as evidence, for auditing purposes.

## 13. Asset Register/Records:

The accounting department is responsible for maintaining the TCA records.

# Dufferin County

TIERED RESPONSE

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## **Introduction**

This Tiered Response Agreement (TRA) between Dufferin County Paramedic Service (DCPS), Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) – Dufferin Detachment, and the Municipal Fire Department (Caledon, Erin, Grand Valley, Mulmur-Melancthon, Orangeville, Rosemont, Shelburne, and Southgate providing service within the County of Dufferin authorizes the activation of tiered response to those conditions identified by the participants in this agreement as requiring it.

For the purpose of this agreement, a tiered response is the response of more than one agency for emergency incidents. This agreement does not limit requests from agencies for secondary response/back-up from other agencies.

The Appendices to this agreement note the specified conditions requiring a tiered response. Appendix A outlines the broad categories for all agencies. The specified conditions requiring a tiered response will be recommended by the TRA Steering Committee - Appendix B. These conditions may be amended as agreed by the TRA Steering Committee based on agency data to support the amendment. Appendix C outlines the allied agency response to medical calls.

Appendix C is intended to be a “living document” and updated as required based on the methodology outlined by Paramedic Services. Appendix D will be an ongoing tracking sheet used to track changes to the Tiered response criteria.

Notwithstanding the contents of this agreement, this document is intended solely as an operational guideline for tiered response. It does not constitute a legal agreement or establish binding standards.

The agreement should be reviewed on an annual basis to identify any alterations or modifications necessary in the agreement and/or appendixes to ensure that mutually agreed operational requirements are maintained as intended for local service levels.

## **Definitions**

CACC – Central Ambulance Communication Centre

DCPS – Dufferin County Paramedic Service

FDs – Fire Departments – for the purpose of this agreement this refers to all Municipal Fire Departments who have signing authority related to this agreement including Caledon, Dundalk, Erin, Grand Valley, Mulmur-Melancthon, Orangeville, Rosemont, and Shelburne

FREI – Febrile, Respiratory, Enteric, Illness – this acronym is used to notify responders of a potential infectious disease which includes symptoms such as fever, shortness of breath, cough, vomiting, and diarrhea

MPDS – Medical Priority Dispatch System

OPP – Ontario Provincial Police

PHIPPA – Personal Health Information Protection Act

PPE – Personal Protective Equipment

TRA – Tiered Response Agreement

## Roles and Responsibilities

All agencies agree to respond to 911 requests for service as outlined in Appendix A and Appendix C within the County of Dufferin when tiered.

- CACC will tier the emergency to the respective FD's Communication Centre within sixty (60) seconds of committing the call to the CACC dispatch system for all call types identified in Appendix A, only if additional time criteria have not been selected.
- This agreement acknowledges that fire and police emergencies take precedence over requests for medical tiered response and as a result may necessitate the respective agency not being available to respond to the medical emergency.
- During emergencies declared under the County of Dufferin or local municipal Emergency Response Plan, it is acknowledged that the emergency takes precedence, and this Letter of Agreement may be amended as necessary.
- In the event of a conflict or the need to clarify issues arising from this agreement, the parties agree that they will first attempt to resolve such issues at an operational level. Failing which and for any other purposes regarding this Letter of Agreement, the TRA Steering Committee shall be the contacts for formal resolution.
- In the event of a change in the fire dispatch centre or fire boundary areas, the respective FD agrees to notify the Paramedic Service and Cambridge CACC of the change.
- This agreement shall commence on the date signed by all parties and continue on an annual basis, renewed automatically unless terminated in writing effective thirty (30) days from the date of receipt of the official notice.
- Cambridge CACC will not tier FD's to nursing homes, medical clinics, medical facilities or retirement homes where there is a Medical Doctor (MD), Nurse Practitioner (NP), Physician Assistant (PA), Registered Nurse (RN), or Registered Practical Nurse (RPN) on scene.
  - Exception: All vital signs absent/cardiac arrest calls will be tiered regardless if there is an MD, NP, PA, RN, or RPN on scene.
- For emergencies in which paramedics require additional assistance and the fire service was not initially tiered, as soon as patient assessment has been completed paramedics will request additional support which may include FD.
- All parties agree to uphold patient confidentiality in accordance with current legislation including but not limited to PHIPA.
- FD will be responsible for supplying their own medical equipment PPE for medical emergencies, unless a previous agreement between the FD's and DCPS exists. At no time, will a FD's request equipment from paramedics to re-stock disposable equipment/supplies that may have been used on an emergency call. Appendix E lists the equipment/supplies that DCPS will provide to Dufferin County Fire Departments upon request. All requests will be submitted to DCPS management, and they will coordinate with an acceptable date/time to pick up equipment/supplies from Orangeville station.

- Cambridge CACC will notify Fire Communication Centre of calls for which infectious disease could be present by using the acronym FREI positive. It is the responsibility of the fire communication centre to notify the responding fire firefighters of a potential hazard on scene and as such the fire fighters responding are required to don appropriate PPE. At a minimum for FREI positive calls, fire fighters will don fit-tested and seal-checks N95 mask, medical gloves, and eye protection. Additional PPE including gown, Tyvek suit, boot covers, and face shield, will be donned based on current situation such as declared outbreaks and a point of care risk assessment.
- In order to reduce the risk of exposure to potentially infectious disease(s), FDs will complete a risk assessment and determine the appropriate number of fire fighters required to provide necessary patient care. Every effort will be made to reduce the number of personnel in the immediate area.
- Each FD will ensure that all personnel responding to medical emergencies have immediately available and are trained in proper use, limitations and donning/doffing procedures of Personal Protective Equipment appropriate for any medical emergencies. FDs will also ensure that personnel responding to medical emergencies have all appropriate immunizations as outlined by the Canadian Immunization Guide.
- FD's and DCPS will ensure that all personnel responding to an incident will be easily identifiable as a first responder.
- FD's and DCPS both agree to respond to calls for service according to the agreed upon criteria as set out in Appendix A and Appendix C and further that the practice of "jumping calls" would not be common practice.
- DCPS will work with Dufferin County FDs to ensure an effective Medical Tiered Response program by assisting with:
  - Annual Training that includes but is not limited to, Introduction to Paramedic Services equipment and processes, Equipment types and locations, Stretcher removal and handling and any other information agreed to between the Chiefs. Any stipend or wage payable shall be the responsibility of each agency involved for their own employees.
- Each Party shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the other Party, including its elected officials, employees, agents, representatives, and volunteers, from any and all liabilities, claims, demands, losses, costs, damages, expenses, actions, suits, or proceedings of any kind, whether made directly or indirectly, arising out of or related to this Agreement. This includes, but is not limited to, bodily injury, sickness, disease, death, or damage to or destruction of tangible property caused by the acts or omissions of the indemnifying Party or its elected officials, officers, employees, agents, contractors, customers, invitees, or licensees. This indemnification obligation shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

## **Appendix B**

### **Tiered Response Committee (TRC)**

#### **Terms of Reference**

#### **Purpose**

The Dufferin County Tiered Response Committee establishes and monitors the Tiered Response Agreement among Dufferin County Paramedic Services, Ontario Provincial Police – Dufferin Detachment, and Municipal Fire Departments within the County of Dufferin (Grand Valley, Mulmur-Melancthon, Orangeville, Rosemont, and Shelburne) and provides advice to these agencies on compliance with and changes to the Agreement.

#### **Committee Structure**

The committee will consist of representatives from all County of Dufferin emergency services organizations including:

- Paramedic Chief, Dufferin County Paramedic Service
- Inspector, OPP Dufferin Detachment
- Fire Chief, Grand Valley & District Fire Department
- Fire Chief, Mulmur-Melancthon Fire Department
- Fire Chief, Orangeville Fire Department
- Fire Chief, Rosemont & District Fire Department
- Fire Chief, Shelburne & District Fire Department

The TRC will be chaired on a rotational basis by each representative of the committee. The chair will serve a term of no longer than one (1) year.

#### **Ad hoc Members**

- Fire Chief, Caledon Fire
- Fire Chief, Dundalk
- Fire Chief, Erin

#### **Meeting Frequency and Attendance**

- Meetings will occur on a bi-annual basis in coordination with the County Fire meetings
- Meetings can be called on an ad-hoc basis
- If a member is unable to attend, a designate may be sent in their place
- Agenda items may be brought forward by any member for discussion
- Administrative support will be provided by DCPS for the purpose of taking minutes and creating agendas for the TRC

#### **Objectives**

- Recommend and review the terms of the Tiered Response Agreement.
- Review relevant data pertaining to compliance with the Tiered Response Agreement and recommend actions to improve performance.
- Establish and monitor system performance indicators - call handling times, call response types, on scene times, outcomes, call volumes etc.
- Review strategies to improve call notification to allied agencies.
- Review data pertaining to and recommend the specific Medical Priority Dispatch System determinants that require response from police and fire.
